“ My parents moved our family to Roswell in 1964 - it certainly was one of the best and most important decisions ever made by them. I was fortunate to attend Roswell High from 8th grade to my senior year with Allan. We spent a lot of time together, especially playing football & baseball. I remember that he had a nice car - I believe that it was red, fast, and he kept it in immaculate shape. I went with him to a race one Saturday night and saw not only a race, but a demolition derby. Allan was a good person. He was somewhat quiet (most of the time!) and a genuinely nice guy. On the football field - well, that was a different story. He was kind of like Clark Kent - quiet and unassuming off the field, but when he put a helmet on, #75 became a dynamo on the field. He became a starter at defensive end during the 1965 season, his 9th grade year, and by his senior year was a dominant player. He was one of the cornerstones of the 1968 State Championship team that finished with a perfect record of 13 - 0 (the only undefeated football team in school history) and that gave up only 58 points in 13 games. I never played with anyone that was more aggressive or a more physical football player. He jumped over more would-be blockers than anyone that I ever watched. Blocked punts, forced fumbles, sacked quarterbacks - he was a disruptor of opposing offenses. Against Irwin County in the State Championship game, on the 4th play of the game, Allan initiated the 1st Hornet touchdown of the game when he sacked the QB, causing a fumble that was returned by the Hornets for a touchdown. Just a typical play by Allan! He was one of the best to ever wear the green and white. Allan always gave 100% effort on EVERY play - he never knew anything but full speed ahead. He NEVER took a play off. I was honored to have known him and thankful that he was a friend and a teammate. God bless you, Allan.
