George E. Jones, age 99, of Alpharetta, GA passed away on June 10, 2020. He was preceded in death by his wife, Rachel Conner Jones, his daughter Janice Hazel Jones, and parents Mae and Will Jones. He was a long time member of the Alpharetta First United Methodist Church. He graduated from Milton High School, Abraham Baldwin College and the University of Georgia. George enlisted in the USMC serving thirty-two months in the South and Western Pacific, and was discharged as a Captain. He retired from the Veterans Administration and the Alpharetta Post Office. George enjoyed gardening, hunting, fishing and traveling in his Airstream trailer. Due to the COVID-19 virus a memorial service will be held on November 21, 2020 at 11:00AM the Alpharetta First United Methodist Church.
