Haynes K. Lewis-Nguessan (JB), 15 of Roswell, GA died May 16, 2016 as a result of a seizure. He attended Independence High School in Alpharetta, Georgia where he was a freshman.

JB was enrolled in the Fulton County School System in 2006 and was very fond of school. He was well-known and adored by his teachers and staff. He was known for his unique laugh and showed it exuberantly by jumping around with excitement. He enjoyed playing water activities and was known for being well-dressed, clean and tidy. He was a stickler for keeping things neat and in order. He liked to take long walks in the park and his favorite snacks were popsicles, sweet potato chips, bubble gum, fries and cereal bars which he liked to refer to as “cake”.

At a very young age, he was an ingenious problem solver and as he grew older, he learned to modify things on his own to accommodate his needs. He championed his independent self-help skills and loved consistent routines.

As a result of the healthy lifestyle that his dedicated mother created for him, JB flourished and grew quite tall and robust. He was the epitome of youthfulness and good health.
