December 23, 2023 in Sandy Springs at the age of 75.

Anyone who met Jay knew of his love for his family, the outdoors, and his immense passion for

his patients and colleagues. Jay leaves a powerful legacy in the Speech Pathology community

and continues to be a part of our world. He will be missed beyond measure.

“ I have known Jay Riski for 45 years. Jay and I worked happily together at Duke Medical Center for 17 years prior to his leaving for his long tenure at CHOA. Jay and I would often joke that we were more like brothers than just colleagues.

At Duke, a door at the back of my clinic was immediately adjacent to Jay's lab in the speech and hearing clinic. Jay and I had many daily contacts about patients, or we would just spend time with one another.

I watched Jay expand his lab to include instrumentation capable of documenting every clinical observation he would make with patients. He was one of the first clinicians to incorporate Don Warren's PERCI airflow instrumentation into his patient evaluations. He was also one of the first to teach others about the PERCI, giving several enthusiastic short courses at ACPA conventions about this useful clinical instrument.

Jay also made me a better clinician. It was common for Jay to push me beyond what I thought I could do for patients. I can still recall his voice, telling me "Bob, I have a cooperative 4-year-old who needs a palatal lift appliance". Jay often had more confidence in my abilities than I had at the time. I am grateful for having grown as a clinician because of Jay.

I am proud of what Jay accomplished at Duke and then as well at CHOA. I have followed his career closely and am proud of what he accomplished in serving others as a clinician, teacher, clinical researcher, author, and friend to so many. Jay Riski was, in my opinion, the finest craniofacial speech clinician in this country, and perhaps everywhere else.
