



Margaret S. Triplett

December 22, 1916 - January 12, 2007

Margaret S. Triplett, 90, a World War II Red Cross worker in England and France, died on Jan. 12 of pneumonia in an Atlanta area hospital near the home of her daughter, Carolyn T. Lloyd. A resident of Arlington, Mrs. Triplett was born Margaret Morris Scruggs in Burkburnett, Texas. While serving as a Red Cross social worker in a U.S. military hospital in England after D-Day in 1944, she met wounded Army Captain Carlyle Hardin Triplett. After he returned to duty in France, they kept in touch and met again after V-E Day. They were married in Paris in Sept. 1945. He died in 1963 and is buried in his hometown; Chester, S.C. Mrs. Triplett graduated from Texas Women's College in Denton and received a Masters in Library Science from Drexel University. Before joining the Red Cross, she was a teacher in Texas. Moving with her husband's career in sales for James Manufacturing Company, she lived in Raleigh, N.C., Springville, N.Y. and Doylestown, PA. There she became head reference librarian in Bucks County Free Library. Following retirement from the library, she moved to Arlington in 1980 where she resided until December. Besides her daughter and son-in-law, Herbert L. Slayden, of Cumming, GA, survivors include nephews William Lindsay Triplett III, Durham, N.C. and Morris Scruggs, Gatesville, TX.
